

## Why is this technique helpful?

- Using recycled mattresses to grow plants helps reuse mattresses instead of throwing them away.
- It also makes it easier to grow food in in dry, desert environments.

## Old Mattresses Used to Grow Plants

Could old mattresses be used to grow food in the desert? A group of scientists think they might!

A team from the University of Sheffield are growing plants without soil. They're using old foam mattresses instead!

They've been working with refugees in a camp in Jordan. The camp uses a lot of foam mattresses for people's beds. These then get thrown away and end up on the landfill.

The scientists have found a way to use these leftover mattresses to grow food. They have grown tomatoes and peppers this way.

They chop up the foam into smaller parts and add nutrients, a seedling and a bit of water. Then, they watch the plant begin to grow!

This way uses less water than normal soil. This is great for the desert, where there isn't much water.

The refugees and scientists have worked together to do this. Many of the refugees are experienced farmers.

"I learnt a lot from people who are

farmers," Professor Tony Ryan, one of the scientists, said.

The scientists have trained nearly 1000 refugees on this way of growing food.

The team are very excited about what comes next. They want to raise money to pay for seeds, nutrients and training.

It could be used to grow food in refugee camps across the world.

"We are only at the start of what might be possible," Professor Tony Ryan said.
